evidence that oral health and general bodily health are closely related. Muckraking and paradigm-shifting, *Teeth* exposes for the first time the extent and meaning of our oral health crisis. Each day of childhood is etched into tooth crowns and roots—capturing birth, nursing history, environmental clues, and illnesses.
