Another way parents can help second and third graders is to discuss concepts they may be able to read about, but may not necessarily fully understand, such as reading maps. Included is a story about mummies and list of questions parents might ask their second and third graders about the story to stimulate a thoughtful discussion, and prepare their children for fourth grade where students begin to read to learn rather than learn to read.
